Breakout Session II

Yikes! Stereotypes!

Pranav Garg, University of Central Florida, Peer Leader
A stereotype is a commonly held popular belief about specific social groups/types of individuals/country of origin. Stereotypes, however, are standardized and simplified conceptions of groups based on some prior assumptions. In a discussion of some of these notions, we'll go stepwise to the myths associated with each country and reveal what is the reality instead. This is an interactive session that will allow participants to broaden their horizons beyond cultural and racial stereotypes. **(DINING ROOM)**

Leadership and Cultural Expression: Russian Ballet and Literature

While we often think of leadership in terms of politics or economics, one should not overlook a country's cultural expression and the lasting impact it can have on other regions of the world. 	<p>Transforming Your International Experience: Intercultural Learning and Leadership Dawn Wharram, Rollins College, Advisor, International Programs and Sarah Mills, student, Rollins College How can living abroad transform a student? This session will familiarize participants with one student’s study abroad experience and her transition back to campus. In addition, we will discuss how living abroad offers the skill set that allows students to grow and mature as leaders on campus and beyond. Participants will work in groups on activities related to intercultural learning and leadership. (DINING ROOM)</p>
	<p>Knowing the Dynamics: What to Learn Before You Lead Tiona Cage, Florida State University, International Student Advisor This session introduces participants to some social theory and provides useful tips on how leaders can be more conscious of social and political dynamics at various levels in order to be more effective within particular settings. Participants will work in groups to plan a strategy for researching the dynamics of a fictional group/community using some practical tools and methods provided during an initial presentation. (CLASSROOM)</p>
	<p>Effective Leadership and the Benefits of Campus Involvement Jose Dasilva and Andrea Arce-Trigatti, Tallahassee Community College, Staff Becoming a more engaged student leader can benefit not only a student’s college experience, but also a future professional career. Activities in this session will help students identify hidden talents that can be put to constructive use through engagement on campus, and will help students think critically about effective leadership as they work together on solving an assigned task. (LODGE)</p>
	<p>Resolving Conflict Across Cultures Makhicia Brooks, Florida A&M University, Peer Leader An engaging look into how cultural differences, personal experiences and perceptions, and differing values and beliefs, affect the dynamics of conflict. Through role-playing, freeze theatre and dialogue this session will focus on: 1) acknowledgment of cultural and personal differences of parties in conflicts, 2) techniques that different cultures use to solve problems, 3) key terms and techniques used to ease conflict, and 4) methods of verbally settling conflict without use of excessive force or harsh language. (GYM)</p>

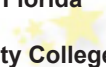

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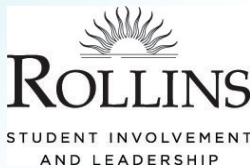
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
